



Hand or wrist operations: aftercare advice

Information for patients from the Hand Therapy Service

You have had an operation on your hand or wrist. This information sheet provides you with advice on looking after your hand and/or wrist and their dressings at home.

How should I look after my hand/wrist at home?

- Do not get your dressings or hand/wrist wet, and do not remove your bandages.
- Keep your hand/wrist elevated (raised) for at least 48 hours. It is helpful to keep your sling on during this time.
- Start moving your fingers as soon as they are comfortable, gently moving them towards making a fist, as your dressing allows.
- **Do not** use your other hand to bend or straighten your fingers, unless told to do so by your consultant or therapist.
- After your operation, everyday tasks such as housework may become a problem due to limited movement of your hand or wrist. You are advised to make allowances for this.



What should I do if my hand hurts after surgery?

Pain should be controlled with simple painkillers, which are given to you before you leave the hospital. If you lose feeling in your fingers, they become discoloured or cold, or your hand becomes more painful and you are worried about an infection, then contact the Day Surgery Centre, your GP, or the Accident and Emergency (A&E) department (see phone numbers on the next page).

Your hand and fingers may feel numb for 72 hours after your operation, so you may not feel any pain. We advise that you protect your hands and fingers during this time, until feeling in your skin returns to normal.

When will my stitches be removed?

If they are non-dissolving, your stitches should be removed 10 to 14 days after your operation by your consultant, therapist, or at your GP practice, unless told otherwise by your consultant. This will be discussed with you before you leave hospital.

Will I need a follow-up appointment?

An outpatient appointment to see your consultant, or a therapy appointment following your operation will be sent to you through the post, if appropriate.

When can I drive again?

You should not drive for at least two weeks after your operation.

Insurance policies differ as to the cover provided, so please check with your insurance company before driving after your operation.

When can I return to work?

This varies depending on the work you do. You should discuss this with your GP/consultant.

If you are in a supervisory or managerial position that does not need full use of your hand, you could return to work within a few days of surgery. Other light manual jobs may need two to three weeks off work. Heavy manual jobs may need you to be off work for a few weeks longer.
