

Leaflet B: Information following a therapeutic termination of pregnancy

Information for parents from Women's Health

We apologise if this leaflet reaches you at an inappropriate time for you and your family. The decision to terminate a pregnancy, at whatever stage, is always a painfully difficult one, and we want to offer you all the care and support we can. This leaflet explains how our Trust treats both early and mid-term therapeutic terminations and describes some of the support available for you and your family.

What is a therapeutic termination of pregnancy?

A therapeutic termination is the termination of pregnancy for foetal abnormality.

What happens following an early pregnancy loss?

(Up to 15 weeks and six days gestation)

Unless the mother tells us otherwise, all early pregnancy losses will receive communal cremation. This involves individual losses - each personally identified - being cremated together at Thanet Crematorium on the last Thursday of the month following the loss, at 9:20 for 9:30am* (so if, for example, your loss happened any time in June, the communal ceremony would take place on the last Thursday of July). It is your personal choice whether or not you attend this ceremony, and you will be supported in whatever you decide to do.

More information about this simple, confidential, and respectful service is available from the hospital chaplains, whose contact numbers are listed in this leaflet on page 3. If, for strictly religious or cultural reasons, you are unhappy with these arrangements, you will need to contact the hospital chaplains **within two weeks of your loss**. The chaplains will be pleased to discuss other options available at no cost to you and your family.



*Should this fall on a public holiday the ceremony will normally take place on the last working day before at the same time and place. We recommend that you confirm this with the hospital chaplains. Please note, that following the communal cremation, ashes are not returned to parents but are scattered in the Baby and Child area of St John's Cemetery (next to Thanet Crematorium).

We will need you to sign some paperwork to allow us to proceed with either the communal cremation or private arrangement.

Please note that very early losses are sometimes difficult to identify, either visually or by scientific investigation. Therefore, in some rare cases, the loss may not be included in the communal ceremony, but this does not prevent you or your family attending the service as part of your grieving process.

What happens following a mid-term pregnancy loss?

(16 to 23 weeks and six days gestation)

Parents may choose individual cremation, individual burial, or communal cremation (as mentioned in the previous paragraph). You will need to complete and sign certain paperwork to allow us to proceed with the arrangements. Where parents fail to tell us of which option they prefer within three weeks of their loss, or that they do not wish to be involved in any way whatsoever, the baby will be included with the early losses in the monthly communal cremation ceremony. Parents may of course, make their own private arrangements and would need to sign certain documents saying that this is their wish. In such cases families will be expected to meet all the financial costs involved.

Please note that if you have agreed to a post-mortem examination and have chosen communal cremation* for your baby, you are strongly advised to contact the hospital chaplains around three weeks after your loss as occasionally, the investigations may still be awaiting completion and your baby may have to be included in a later ceremony.

*The communal cremation ceremony is held on the last Thursday of the month following the loss, at 9:20 for 9:30am at Thanet Crematorium. Please note, that following the communal cremation, ashes are not returned to parents but are scattered in the Baby and Child area of St John's Cemetery (next to Thanet Crematorium). So if for example, your loss happened any time in June, the communal ceremony would take place on the last Thursday of July. Should this fall on a public holiday the ceremony will normally take place on the last working day before at the same time and place. We recommend that you confirm this with the hospital chaplains.

Will there be any cost involved?

If the hospital is making the arrangements, the Trust will cover all basic costs - whether cremation or burial. Some families may wish to contribute to the Trust's costs if they feel it would help the grieving process and should contact the hospital chaplains if they wish to do so. There will however, be added expenses should you wish, for example to use an alternative funeral director, choose a graveyard or crematorium out of our designated area, book limousines for family transportation, or place private commemoration. All these extra costs would have to be met by the family.

What about memorial books and services?

There are memorial books in the chapels of our hospitals in Ashford, Canterbury, and Margate. If you would like your baby's name entered, please contact one of the hospital chaplains. There is no charge for this service.

In addition, we hold an annual baby memorial service which many parents have found to be both a healing and helpful experience. If you would like us to contact you with details of this service, please give your contact details to your nurse, midwife, or doctor.

Helping us to help others

We hope this leaflet has been helpful and reassuring to you at this difficult time. It is a painful and sensitive subject to raise with parents and families who are experiencing a wide variety of feelings and emotions. We are always looking to improve the care we give to parents and families like yourselves, no matter how or at what stage the pregnancy ended. We welcome any comments - positive or negative - that you may have on the help and support we have offered during your time of loss. We wish you well for the future and assure you of our continuing care and concern.
